# **Message from our Tumuaki**

**MONDAY 14 APRIL 2025** 

Tena koutou katoa whānau. Nau mai, haere mai ki te Hata Meri Hōhepa - te Kura Katorika o Papamoa.

It has been a memorable and action-packed Term 1 of learning at Suzanne Aubert Catholic School. Our roll has been growing steadily and our tamariki have been immersed in a wide range of learning opportunities to explore our concept of Whānaungatanga - Belonging. Some recent key highlights from this term have been:

- **Pōhutukawa Learning Hub Blessing:** It was special to have Bishop Richard bless and officially open our Pōhutukawa Learning Hub at the end of term. Our senior Year 4-6 Kopukairoa learners are excited about shifting into their new learning environment for Term 2.
- Holy Week Liturgies: Each team presented their liturgies in the last week of term to share the stories of Jesus in the lead up to Easter. These included Palm Sunday, Washing of the Feet, The Last Supper and the Stations of the Cross.
- Multi-Purpose Hall Construction: Approval has been provided and construction is due to begin in the holidays for our multi-purpose hall which is scheduled to be complete in October. This will be a wonderful facility to host Masses, liturgies, learning celebrations and other events for the school, parish and local community.
- Maths No Problem: It has been rewarding to see our tamariki be immersed in our Maths No Problem program which supports our Maths curriculum learning. The learners are developing a mastery of foundational maths skills through a clear scope and sequence, problem solving and collaborative practice.
- **Movie Night:** Our school families were treated to an outdoor movie night in the last week of term to see the film 'Luck' for our Aubert Whānau Group fundraiser. There was an incredible turnout and a beautiful evening under the full moon to connect together as a school community.

# PÕHUTUKAWA LEARNING HUB BLESSING

On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> April, Bishop Richard blessed and officially opened our new Pōhutukawa Learning Hub. This was a very special event within our foundation school journey and is a testimony to the growth of our Catholic learning community.


**Thank You:** We would like to take this opportunity to thank our Project Management team from IDS and the construction team at Watts and Hughes for designing and building such an inviting learning environment for our tamariki and kaiako. We would also like to specifically and personally thank Greg Dickey (Watts and Hughes Project Manager) for his professionalism, commitment, and craftsmanship throughout the process. Many thanks, Greg!

**Pōhutukawa:** Pōhutukawa was chosen as the name for the new hub as this was a significant native plant that was used in Suzanne Aubert's herbal rongoā (medicines) in the late 1800s and early 1900s. Pōhutukawa bark was used for its anti-inflammatory and antioxidant properties, particularly in skincare. The 'gold' Pōhutukawa flower was used in our branding and design rather than the traditional red as this is a special variety that originates on Mōtītī Island off the coast of Papamoa. Pōhutukawa now asserts itself with pride alongside our existing learning hubs Kawakawa and Harakeke, which were also chosen for their uses as native plants in herbal rongoā.



**Hub Layout - Term 2:** Our teaching teams have been busy moving furniture and setting up resources across their new learning hubs so they are ready for the beginning of Term 2. 




# SHRUNK ALEXANDER KLEANTHOUS (YEAR 3)

# SUZANNE AUBERT EZRA BADENHORST (YEAR 4)

Suzanne Aubert was born in a place called Lyon in France 1835. At the age of just 24, Suzanne accepted an invitation to be a missionary in Auckland. One year later Suzanne sailed to New Zealand on a whaling ship and learnt the Maori language on the way. At age 36 she left Auckland to work for the Catholic Maori Mission in Hawkes Bay. She didn't want to get married instead she wanted to serve God.

A bunch of years later, Suzanne went to Jerusalem to revive the Catholic Mission. Six years later she raised money for St Joseph's Church. Shortly after this Suzanne was appointed Mother Superior. At the age of 64, she set up a soup kitchen and made it open to all the hungry. Following this, Suzanne travelled to Rome. Shortly after that she helped nurses and then in 1926 she died at the age of 91. What a life she had.



## MISSING BEAU GUTHARDT (YEAR 5)

One sunny afternoon, Brooke was playing in her backyard with her dog Lily next to the pool, on her dad's freshly mowed grass. While throwing a ball, she accidentally threw it too hard and it went over the fence.
