Wow! What a busy and unusual year we have had. The events of 2020 were certainly unanticipated and an adventure for everyone. Now as the calendar year winds down we enter the church season of Advent, a period of preparation before Christmas. During this season we take time to carefully prepare for the coming of Our Lord and are reminded in the Gospel to make a special effort to find ways to grow closer to God. The mission for us during Advent is to 'Prepare the way for the Lord' by walking alongside each other, being a comfort to one another, being witnesses to the Good News and being prophets of peace and hope. It is in being people of action for the good of all that we begin to know what the true presence of God means in our lives.



To keep this firmly in our hearts and minds over this hectic and busy season, here a few ways you and your whānau might like to prepare for a Christ-centred Christmas:

Design an Advent wreath:

This can be as simple as four candles surrounded by greenery brought in from outside. Light the candles at a time that suits your family (meals, before leaving for school /work, end of the day before bed) and use the wreath as a focus for prayer.

Perform acts of generosity:

This can be a simple act of kindness. Caring for neighbours, making donations or volunteering for a local charity.

Devote time to daily prayer:

Traditional prayers, scripture readings, prayers from the heart, meditation, prayer art, worship music or simply quiet time set aside each day help create a closer relationship to Jesus.

Make memories for the New Year:

Reflect on the previous year and capture children's memories that can become part of your family story. Capture these on camera, draw pictures, write songs or journal.

Decorate a Jesse Tree:

Our Emerging Learning Principles

Our Seven Emerging Learning Principles are underpinned by research and were developed through a consultation process with our community, Board of Trustees and staff. They set the direction for how we can achieve our vision and provide the platform for our signature practices in learning. Our Suzanne Aubert learners are:

Christ-like

We are a Catholic School. We promote the Gospel values, follow the example of Jesus Christ and are guided by the teachings of the Catholic Church. We follow the Charism of Suzanne Aubert.



Compassionate



We promote a sense of service and empathy towards others.
We value kindness, manaakitanga and putting the needs of others before our own. We align with the mission of the Sisters of Compassion.

Collaborative

We value the social nature of learning. We promote opportunities to coconstruct learning with students, kaiako, whanau, experts and the wider community.



Creative



We value creativity, innovation and opportunities to solve problems from a range of perspectives. We promote learning that challenges the way we see the world and to imagine the impossible.

Curious

We value curiosity, inquiry thinking and learner agency. We facilitate learning that promotes questioning, stretching and critical thinking. We promote ongoing growth for all learners by encouraging our tamariki to lead their own learning.



Connected



We value authenticity in connection. We facilitate learning that connects with people (whanau, experts, community), place (significant environments) and purpose (authentic contexts).

Our learners are connected citizens in a local and global community.

Courageous

We value courage and resilience. We facilitate learning that promotes risk taking, determination and a desire to achieve. We encourage our learners to grow by responding to change and challenges.



Whānau Teacher

Every child at Suzanne Aubert belongs to a whānau class and has a whānau teacher. This teacher is the first contact for parents and caregivers and is responsible for the pastoral care of your child. The first and last 15-20 minutes of every day is spent with the whānau teacher taking attendance, sharing prayer and celebrating whanaungatanga. Research indicates that we make the most gains with students when we develop strong learning focused relationships. To support the transition process for our learners, we believe it is important for siblings to be with each other in these whānau groups.



That is why if you have more than one child in the same learning community, you will notice that they are in the same whānau class. A letter has recently been sent to you informing who your child's whānau teacher is for 2021.

People - Learning Communities

Our learning communities are the teams of people that your child will be learning alongside. Our tamariki are placed into these teams based on Year levels. These learning communities will often collaborate together in their daily learning and for school events and experiences. Our three learning communities are named after the local



cultural narrative of the Papamoa Hills. This narrative tells the story of the Three Whales and how they came to rest as guardians over the Papamoa coast (<u>link here</u>). Our learning communities are:

Hikurangi Baby Whale:

Year 0-2

Mangatawa Mother Whale:

Year 3-4

Kopukairoa Father Whale:

Year 5-6

Place - Learning Environment

Our learning environments are the places where your child will be learning. This learning place is both the physical classroom buildings as well as the natural physical environment. Our learning places are flexible and innovative and students will have opportunities to work across these spaces. Our learning environments are named after the native plants that Suzanne Aubert used in her rongoa (herbal remedies) as part of her healing ministry. The two learning environments being used in 2021 are:



Kawakawa Year 0-2



Harakeke: Year 3-6

Stationery



Our stationery provider is OfficeMax. To order your child's stationery, please click the following link and follow the instructions: My School Stationery

In the online ordering, Junior students are classed as Year 0-2 and Seniors are classed as Year 3-6.

Uniform

Our school uniform provider is **Kukri**. The uniform has been developed in consultation with the community, Board of Trustees and staff. It has been designed for durability, comfort and to meet the needs of active learning all year round. You can order your child's uniform online from mid January <u>here</u>. We will have sample sizes at the school site from Monday 18th January for your child to try on. Your order will arrive on your doorstep in 2-3 working days after purchase.



School Fees

As a Catholic state-integrated School we are funded by both the State and Diocese. This determines our fee structure. Our school fees are as follows:

Attendance Dues:

\$444 per child annually. These dues are payable to the Catholic Diocese of Hamilton and go towards funding land and property.

Special Character Donation:

\$50 per child annually. This donation is payable to the Catholic Diocese of Hamilton and goes towards funding Religious Education, resources and professional development.

Donation Scheme:

Suzanne Aubert Catholic School has opted into the government's donation scheme which means we will not be requesting any other fees in 2021. There are some caveats to this:

- Our eligibility for this scheme is only at this point in time while we are decile 7. If our future decile rating was to change, then the Board would need to review this and the community be consulted.
- Some elements of school learning such as camps, experiences and technology may still require financial contributions from families. We will provide more detail and notice of this as the need arises.

Music Tuition



We are very excited to be able to offer music tuition to our Suzanne Aubert learners in 2021. This is offered through MusiqHub. The music teachers will be facilitating lessons on Thursdays at our school site in the following instruments:
