Message from our Tumuaki

Tena koutou katoa whānau. Nau mai, haere mai ki te Hata Meri Hōhepa - te Kura Katorika o Papamoa.

We have had an exciting start to Term 3 with our learners exploring the theme:

'COLOUR MY WORLD'

Our guiding Maori Whakatauki is: 'KIA MURAMURA TOKU AO' This translates to mean: 'Let our world be bright with colour'

This concept provides an exciting provocation for learning this term as our tamariki navigate art, place and culture in the world around us. The learners have been exploring the theme through an integrated curriculum approach including:

Religious Education: Identify what it means to be a culturally diverse Church community.

Visual Arts: Explore colour theory and the use of colour across art in different cultures

Science: Identify the properties of colour in our natural and physical world

Literacy: Explore text and writing opportunities that focus on different cultural perspectives.

Maths - Geometry: Inquire into geometric shape and transformation and its connection to visual art. Social Sciences - Geography: Inquire into world cultures and significant places around the world.

We encourage you to talk to your child about their learning and how they make sense of our concept this term. Consider questions like: What were you learning about today? What did you enjoy most in your learning today? What are you finding tricky in your learning? This helps to build the language of learning for our tamariki and grow a learning focused culture in our school.

THE AUBERT KID AWARDS



Special Catholic Character

A Message from our Director of Religious Studies



Everlasting God, May we never forget you, but always behave in the way we know pleases you by loving you and our neighbour as we love ourselves. We make this prayer through Christ our Lord. Amen

Last Sunday was the 19th Sunday of Ordinary time in the Church. Often we feel that Ordinary time is the unimportant time in the Church. Reinforced by the celebration and ceremony of the other Liturgical times. However Ordinary time simply reflects our Latin roots where the word *ordinalis*, refers to numbers in a series and stems from the Latin word *ordo*, from which we get the English word order. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time.

Ordinary time refers to the time in the Church where we live our lives, not the huge Celebrations of Easter and Christmas or the penance and preparation of Lent and Advent. It is in living our lives that we truly reflect the Mission of the Church. How do we see our Neighbour as Christ, how do we show others Jesus in our words and actions?

Ordinary time and the Gospel readings on Sunday, during this time, explore these ideas and have us walk with Jesus as our Teacher just as he did with his disciples revealing the Truth and teaching us how to live. Yesterday's reading is Luke 12 22-24, 27-34. This Gospel explores God's care and love for birds and flowers and how we as humans receive this same love and more in our relationship with him. It is a reminder to us not to put our worry and care on the material things of life but rather think on what is most important to us and remember this. 'Wherever your treasure is, that's where your heart will be.' These coming weeks think on how your Ordinary time, your daily life is sharing the Mission of the Church with others.



RE LEARNING FOCUS

This term our RE learning focus is Kia Noho Hāhi- Being Church. The aim of this learning is for young people to develop an understanding of what it means to be Catholic in the world today in terms of faith, discipleship and sacramental living. The people are the Church, not the buildings and structure. They will learn about and develop skills in Catholic Social Teaching and decision making. The focus is to be people of hope, who live their best life and embed and live out the teachings of Jesus in their daily interactions.
