Message from our Tumuaki

Tena koutou katoa whānau. Nau mai, haere mai ki te Hata Meri Hōhepa - te Kura Katorika o Papamoa.

We are in an exciting phase of growth and development in our kura Suzanne Aubert Catholic School. Our roll is growing every term and will be close to 150 learners at the end of the year. We are currently negotiating with the Ministry of Education to extend this roll limit to 200 for the end of next year. Beyond this, Stage 2 of our development will include another learning hub, a multi-purpose centre and an additional sports turf. It is rewarding to see new additions to enhance life for our learners at Suzanne Aubert currently in process including senior playground, edible/herbal gardens, sports uniform, road crossing, music instrumentation to name a few.

At Suzanne Aubert, the actions and evidence of learning for our tamariki are mapped back to our strategic plan. This strategic plan was developed by the school Board to set the direction and pathway for our school moving into the future. Our plan consists of 4 key strategic goals which are to be developed over the next three years. Our special Catholic Character is integrated into each strategic goal and the associated actions. Over the coming Aubert Oracle newsletters, keep an eye out for our 'Strategic Spotlight' where we will explore each goal and what it looks like at Suzanne Aubert on a daily basis.

WATERLINE

This week the Harakeke learners were excited to have a visit from Sarahann from Waterline. Her main focus this year was on our Stormwater systems. The learners surveyed the school to discover where our downpipes and storm water drains were located. They also identified the permeable and impermeable surfaces. On her second visit they were introduced to Mapi, a GIS system which shows where all the storm water drains are in Papamoa. The final session involved a practical lesson identifying different pollutants that could go into our Stormwater systems. Our role now is to ensure that we are responsible Kaitiaki and work together to keep our Stormwater healthy.






MERI HÖHEPA 2023 CALENDAR




