Ashton Redgate and Joel Redgate were also awarded Player of the Year for their respective teams. Well done boys!


CONGRATULATIONS TO THE MAKA FAMILY


CONGRATULATIONS TO THE FERGUSON FAMILY



Kindness sets up kids for a future! Now did you know you could make someone's day by just giving a big, crazy smile right?



I am sure that about 80 percent of the population of flowers, fruits, and veges depend on bees.


