Message from our Tumuaki

MONDAY 4 MARCH 2024

Tena koutou katoa whānau. Nau mai, haere mai ki te Hata Meri Hōhepa - te Kura Katorika o Papamoa. It has been a very positive and exciting beginning to 2024 at Suzanne Aubert Catholic School. We started the year with 180 learners and welcomed 23 new learners to our Suzanne Aubert whānau this term. We are tracking to reach our current maximum roll of 200 learners before the end of the year. This will align well with the development of our new learning hub which will be built adjacent to the existing Harakeke Hub and will contain three learning spaces and a library/multipurpose room. Construction is due to start in Term 4 ready for the beginning of the 2025 school year. This will allow our kura to grow to its next roll maximum of 250 learners. It is exciting to see our learning community grow! Please refer to the most recent update (December 2023) from our Proprietor about the next stages of school building development (attached).

This term, our learning concept is based around the principle of:

'BEING CONNECTED - WHANAUNGATANGA'

This concept provides an exciting provocation for learning this term as our tamariki explore opportunities to celebrate their identity, promote a sense of belonging and identify the connections they have to people and place. It is great to see this learning come alive already this year for our school whānau through Whanaungatanga Day, our Whanaungatanga Picnic and learning our Pepeha. MIHI WHAKATAU & GOSPEL HUI



HOME-SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP

At Suzanne Aubert Catholic School we believe in the importance of a learning focused partnership between ākonga (learner), whānau (family) and kaiako (teachers). This is the key to setting your child up for success in their learning at school. A key part of this partnership is communicating information to parents and whānau about learning. This includes information about:

- Our Pedagogy: The science of our Aubert signature learning approaches
- Our Practice: How we teach through the NZ Curriculum (Te Mataiaho)
- Our Evidence: The data that supports your child's progress and achievement
- Our Progressions: The goals or next steps to help your child make expected progress
- Our Environment: How our flexible and innovative classroom environments promote learning
- Our Expectations: Ideas and resources to support your child's learning at home.

At Suzanne Aubert, we communicate about learning in a variety of ways. This takes form as progress reports (mid year and end of year), learning partnership hui (Term 2), learning stories (twice a term) and learning celebrations (once per term). Other opportunities also include our recent Whanaungatanga Day and Parent Information Hui. Thank you to those parents and whānau who came along to support this. It was a great opportunity to connect about learning at Suzanne Aubert.

A Message from our Director of Religious Studies





As we step into the special time of Lent, we invite you to join us in growing closer to God through praying, fasting and giving. Lent is like a spring time for our spirits. It's a chance for us to think more deeply about our faith, our connection with God, and how we can be compassionate and caring people.

What Lent is About:

Lent lasts for 40 days, just like the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness. During this time, we prepare our hearts for Easter, which celebrates Jesus rising from the dead.

In Lent, we:

- PRAY Talk to God: We pray and talk to God more often. We listen to what He has to say to us in prayer and scripture.
- FASTING Give something up: Lent is a time for giving up things that distract us from what's important, like too much TV, device screens or sweet treats.
- **GIVING Give to others:** During Lent we aim to give our time, money or goods to those in need in our community.

Ideas for home during Lent:

As Whānau, there are many things we can do to make Lent special:

- Pray Together: Spend time praying together as a family, like saying thank you before meals or praying before bedtime.
- Read Stories from the Bible: Read stories from the Bible about Jesus and talk about what they mean for us.
- Do Random acts of kindness: Look for ways to help others, like helping a neighbour or donating to charity.
- **Give Up Something Small:** Think about giving up something up as a family like sweets or video games.



- **Go to Mass:** Attend Mass at school on Sundays at 8:30 and learn more about Lent with our parish and community.
- Write Down Thoughts and Feelings: Keep a journal where you can write down prayers. reflections and feelings about Lent.

Let's support each other as we journey through Lent together. May this be a time of learning, growing, and becoming closer to God for our families and our school community.

On Ash Wednesday, we celebrated with a special liturgy. Ash Wednesday marks the beginning Lent. It is a time for us to turn back to God with open hearts and grow closer to him through prayer, fasting and giving. During our liturgy, we received the ashes as a symbol of our repentance.



Senior Playground Fundraising

We are excited to be getting closer to our fundraising target for our senior playground! This playground was designed by our senior learners and Playground Creations. It includes our local cultural story, connection to local iwi and equipment that extends children's physical capability and encourages collaborative play.

Our Suzanne Aubert community have worked incredibly hard to fundraise for this project over the last 18 months. We have raised **\$110,000** of our total cost of **\$163,000** (GST excl.). This includes:

- TECT Grant: \$50,000
- Financial Assistance Scheme (Diocese): \$35,000
- PTFA Fundraising: \$25,000





Staging Phase I (May 2024)

We will now install our playground in stages with Phase 1 including the main playground structures, climbing equipment, bridges, tunnel slide, trampoline and surfacing (see image on left). We only need another \$10,000 to reach this target of \$120,000 for Phase 1. With your help, our playground could be installed as early as May this year!



We are seeking donations from school families, parish and local community to help us make this playground a reality. Every donation helps - no matter how small! If you are able, we welcome your donation. All families that donate will have their name added to our donations board in the school grounds and on the school website. PROJECT JONAH

Last week our learners were treated to an educational session from Amy Sharpland of Project Jonah, a marine welfare charity best known for their protection of whales and dolphins in New Zealand. Amy talked to our tamariki about the different species of whales and dolphins in Aotearoa and what to do if we ever find a stranded whale or dolphin.

We learnt how plastic is having a negative impact on sealife and read the book 'Celia Seagull and the Plastic Sea' by Tauranga author Nicole Miller. We also learned some interesting facts like what is the name of the largest whale on the planet and how much does its tongue weigh.

Following Amy's visit, our junior learners decided that we could all take action by picking up rubbish in our environment that could otherwise end up in the ocean. We were surprised how much litter we found! We want to play our part in being kaitiaki of the land and sea.

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Protect tamariki and rangatahi from rheumatic fever. Get them tested for sore throats. If they have strep throat, it can lead to rheumatic fever if it is not treated quickly. Rheumatic fever is a serious illness because it can cause heart damage. Visit your doctor, nurse or hauora provider who can do a swab to check for strep throat. Free sore throat checks are also available at participating pharmacies in the Bay of Plenty for people aged 3-19 years old who meet the criteria.

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
