

Pokemon cards, fidget spinners, Poppits, marbles etc. Unfortunately, when these enter into school they often create problems. Recently at Suzanne Aubert, we have observed a number of our learners trading these items at school. This has led to unfair trading, arguments and caused a distraction in the learning environment. Therefore, trading cards and any other collectible items are now banned from school. Could you please ensure your child leaves these items at home to enjoy in their own time. Structured Literacy

At Meri Hohepa te Kura Katorika our practice and pedagogy in literacy (reading and writing) reflects the Ministry of Education intent 'to improve literacy outcomes for all learners'. We believe the quality of the teacher is one of the greatest 'in-school' influences on student achievement. We believe in consistency and an evidence-based approach when teaching literacy. With this knowledge in hand we have engaged Learning Matters (iDeaL Platform) to support our journey into Structured Literacy. Current research shows that this will be a game changer - not only for those students who struggle with reading and writing but also for those students who already find success in Literacy.

Principles of Structured Literacy

Structured literacy is distinctive in the principles of how the critical elements are taught. These principles are:

- Diagnostic teaching: the instruction is based on careful and continuous assessment, both informally and formally.
- Explicit instruction: the deliberate teaching of all concepts with continuous student teacher interaction. It is not assumed that students will naturally deduce these concepts on their own.
- Systematic and cumulative: systematic means the organisation of material follows logical order of language. The sequence begins with the easiest and most basic concepts and elements, and progresses methodically to more difficult concepts and elements. Cumulative means each step must be based on concepts previously learned.

Research tells us the crucial elements of Structured Literacy for reading instruction are phonological awareness, alphabetic principle, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. Therefore, at Suzanne Aubert Catholic School, these are explicitly and systematically taught. Our teachers are beginning to teach Structured Literacy across the entire school. This is supported by the iDeaL digital platform which provides our kaiako with guidance with the structure of their literacy lessons. It also provides rigorous assessment data which allows us to determine exactly where each learner is at, where their gaps are and where they need to go next. Marion Kirby from Learning Matters is supporting our learning by providing Professional Development in the form of research, modelling lessons and providing feedback and feedforward on teacher lessons.

What can we do at home to celebrate Pentecost?

MAKE A FRUIT SALAD: The Holy Spirit is said to bring nine spiritual fruits - Love, Joy, Peace, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, Self-control, Truthfulness - Make a fruit salad together and discuss what each fruit could mean and how they all work together in balance. **CELEBRATE WITH BIRTHDAY CAKE:** Pentecost is the birthday of the Church, the moment that thousands of people from diverse backgrounds believed in Jesus and were baptised into the Church. Making a birthday cake is a delicious reminder that the Church is one year older. Each candle can represent a century in the life of the church and the flames could represent the tongues of fire said to visit the Disciples at this time.

BAKE BREAD: Before it was a Christian holiday, Pentecost was a Jewish holiday called the Festival of Weeks, which was a festival to celebrate the wheat harvest. As part of the festivities, loaves of bread were baked and offered in the Temple. Everyone loves fresh baked bread, so this is the perfect excuse to remember the original meaning of the holiday and do some baking with the family.

<u>DECORATE WITH THE COLOUR RED:</u> Because of its connection with the tongues of fire, churches all decorate with red on Pentecost. You can do the same at home — red streamers, red napkins, red plates. It's simple and easy but helps the kids recognize that it's a special day.

DO A MULTI-LANGUAGE CRAFT PROJECT: At the first Pentecost, St. Peter began speaking in many languages as a sign of both diversity and unity. To signify this, you can cut out dove or flame shapes and write "Holy Spirit," or some other word like "Unity," or "Peace," on them in many different languages.

<u>HAVE FUN:</u> This is a true celebration of the Church. It is us, the people from all over the globe with different cultures, ethnicities and backgrounds that are the Church together as one. The one true 'Body of Christ'.
