

TE RĀ O TUMEKE TUMUAKI DAY

Wednesdsay 31st July was Te Rā o Tumeke Tumuaki day, a time to acknowledge and show appreciation for our wonderful Tumuaki, Mr Mills. Our staff surprised Mr Mills with a shared morning tea and a video reflection from some of our foundation learners who have known him since our kura opened in 2021. They shared their thoughts on 'What makes Mr. Mills a Tumeke Tumuaki?' highlighting his unique qualities and the personal impact he has had on them. On behalf of our kura, we want to take a moment to acknowledge and show our appreciation for all that Mr Mills does as the leader of our school. His dedication, vision, and tireless efforts have a profound impact on both the staff and students and his leadership creates an environment where everyone feels valued and inspired to strive for excellence. We are grateful for the guidance, support, and the countless hours invested in making our school a better place.



SUZANNE AUBERT ORCHARD GROVE

At Suzanne Aubert Catholic School, we facilitate an extensive gardening programme which includes designing, growing and harvesting edible and herbal plants. Our tamariki also explore how to prepare food from the garden and learn about the ways we can encourage growth through composting, worm farming and pest management. Our facilitator Nina Henderson from PiPS (People and Plants in Schools) works closely with our learners every week to grow their understanding of plants and gardening.

We are very excited to inform you that we are currently planning our next project - to plant an orchard grove in our school grounds. This grove will be an orchard of 20-30 fruit trees including: apple, pear, plum, peach, lemon, mandarin and feijoa. It will be located on our school site in the western vacant area beside the driveway to the caretaker's shed (see yellow area on the map below). We are currently seeking donations of fruit trees from our school community for our orchard grove. These have been provided from local nurseries and will be available to reserve at school. This is a wonderful way for your whānau to leave a legacy for future generations. Our community planting day will be at **11am on Wednesday 4th September**. STAGE 2 DEVELOPMENT IS UNDERWAY!

It is exciting to see our stage 2 development underway! The construction fencing has been assembled, the worksite it set up and the contractors are busy preparing underground services. The first part of this stage is the construction of our new learning hub which includes 3 large classrooms, a library, 2 breakout rooms and additional toilets. It is great to see this expansion going ahead to help support the rapid growth of our school roll. This phase of building is due to be complete in January 2025 ready for the beginning of the new school year. The second phase of stage 2 will be the development of the multi-purpose community hall which will commence early in the new year. 'WEAVING OUR WORLD' LEARNING FOCUS

This term, our learning concept is: 'WEAVING OUR WORLD'. This concept connects to our living and learning principles: CREATIVITY (AUAHATANGA) and COLLABORATION (MAHI TAHI) Our guiding whakatauki is:

Ko te mahi ngātahi me te auahatanga ka puāwai te iwi. Through collaboration and creativity, the people will blossom.


This concept provides an exciting provocation for learning this term as our tamariki explore opportunities to understand world cultures through the lens of creativity, innovation and collaboration. Each learning team is focusing on different elements of world cultures including art, food, games, sport, music and language. This has been explored in the context of the Olympic Games and how this event brings diverse cultures together in unity. This concept is integrated across the curriculum and will include a variety of opportunities for our learners to develop horizontal connections through Religious Education, literacy, maths, Te Reo Maori, technology, arts and physical education.

CATHOLIC CHARACTER REVIEW

Last term, we had our Catholic Character Review which is a triennial evaluative process across every Catholic school in Aotearoa New Zealand. The review team from the Hamilton Diocese conducted the external review which takes a close look at special Catholic character across the school. During this process the reviewers observed classroom practice, reviewed documentation and interviewed students, staff, whānau and Board members. The review culminates in an external report which includes areas of strength and areas to develop for the future across special Catholic character. Our new report is now linked to our website. INTERNATIONAL STUDY TOUR

At the end of this term, Mr Mills and Mr Piermarini will be travelling overseas on an international study tour along with a group of Principals and Deputy Principals from 8 local schools. They will both be travelling to Gold Coast, Australia on 7 September and Mr Piermarini will return on 15 September. Mr Mills will then continue to travel along with the Principals group to Dubai and the UK. He will return on 27 September (last day of term). The focus of the study tour is to explore the pedagogies, innovative practice, culture, educational leadership and operations of a wide variety of high performing schools based in Australia and England. This tour is funded by the Ministry of Education who recently awarded Principals across New Zealand additional funding for professional learning and wellbeing. Please note that during week 8 while both Mr Mills and Mr Piermarini are away from school, Ms Waddel will be in the Acting Principal role. During week 9-10, Mr Piermarini will then take up the responsibility of Acting Principal while Mr Mills is still away. Celebrating the Assumption of Mary

This Thursday marks the Feast of the Assumption of Mary, a significant holy day in our liturgical calendar. Here are a few meaningful activities you can do as a family to honour Mary the Mother of Jesus on this special day:

- Attend Mass Together: If possible, attend a
 Mass as a family to celebrate the Assumption.
 It's a beautiful way to connect with our faith
 community.
- Family Rosary: Dedicate some time to pray the Rosary, reflecting on the mysteries of Mary's life and her assumption into heaven.
- **Create Marian Art:** Encourage your children to draw or craft something inspired by Mary. This can be a fun, creative way to engage them in the meaning of the day.
- Read a Story About Mary: Share a story or a passage from the Bible about Mary's life and discuss her role as the Mother of Jesus.
- Offer a Special Meal: Prepare a special family meal in honor of Mary, incorporating foods traditionally associated with her, like grapes or herbs.

The Tui Bird Tui-May Blackburn (Year 5)

Tui birds are native to New Zealand. They lay 2 - 4 eggs; there are currently 3,500 - 15,000 Tui birds. Tui birds can also mimic other sounds. They are blue, green, white, black and brown. They also have a little pom pom under their chin.

They make their nest with twigs, sticks and fine grass. The Tui bird used to be called the Mockingbird, however this name is no longer used. The Tui bird is also very intelligent. The male Tui bird is 50% heavier than the female Tui bird.

Tui birds eat fruit, nectar and insects. Tui birds lay eggs around January and September. Tui birds are one of our native birds so we have to look after them.




